drop in calls after the summer rush, 83 persons were placed in jobs in Haywood county.

During the month of October 94 persons were given employment through the office. While in No-vember the peak was reached of 109 placed in jobs, all in this

In addition to the large number placed in positions in this section a large number were given employment out of this county and even out of the state during the three month's period.

One day during the past two weeks, from 9 in the morning until 1 o'clock 115 persons were interviewed, a number including employers making inquiries for workers.

Due to the number of applications and placements made now through the office, which is steadily serving a larger number of people, it is necessary now for all applicants for positions to make definite appointments for interviews, according to Mrs. Alley.

Employers are gradually be-coming more to depend on the local office to supply them with employes, due to the speedy service and reliable type of employes contacted through the service.
