Mrs. J. R. McCracken, supervisor of nursing of the district health Main street. department, was the speaker at a meeting of the Hazelwood Parent-Teacher Association held in the auditorium of the school Monday ninth annual affair his family has evening.

Mrs. McCracken explained that the county health unit is carried on under the supervision of Dr. C. N. Sisk with two field nurses in the county. She said it is the duty of these nurses to instruct families in the care of the sick rather than to do bedside nursing. In speaking on "Mother and Baby Care", she stressed the importance .of proper care of the mother.

Mrs. McCracken reported that in 1941 there were 832 births in the county, 15 still births, 51 deaths of babies under one year of age, and 35 deaths of babies under one month, while 81 mothers had received pre-natal care through the county health department. "For many years mothers had to depend solely on private agencies for such care," Mrs. McCracken said, "but now there is everywhere an increasing number of public agencies. She stated that the two nurses had made 201 visits over the county during the year and urged parents to take advantage of the things the county health department has

to offer. During the business session it was decided to have the February meeting on the first Monday afternoon at 3:15 rather than Monday evening. This change in time was made in compliance with the school movement in the county to
