The center will be open to the public, beginning Monday afternoon, June 22, at 2 o'clock and will remain open during the library's regular schedule hours.

The war information center is sponsored by, and has the full cooperation of the Waynesville Public Library board and the local civilian defense council. The WPA is assisting with the organization and operation of this wartime ser-

r The purpose of the war information center is to make available to the public the latest authentic information and government releases concerning the war and the many war efforts in which the United States is now engaged. "What you can do for Victory" is the subject of the first week's activities at the center. Each week a new phase of America's All Out War efforts will be featured.

Pamphlets, newspaper articles, magazines, charts, maps, and various pictorials will be on display regularly. Pamphlets may be borrowed for a three day period; books for one week. Renewals may be made at any time they are requested.

Among the types of materials already assembled at the center contain information on: America's armed forces; army, navy, air corps, and merchant marine; what to buy; what to save; Roosevelt's Bueprint for Victory; Insignia of each branch of America's armed forces; the progress of America's armament program; "Nazi Poison;" the American Red Cross; your civilian defense organization; Waynesville's wartime activities; descriptive comparisons of the various nations at war; health for victory, and other material.

Reading purely for pleasure will also receive constant attention at the center. With the co-operation of the Waynesville Public Library a special collection of recreational reading will be available at all times. A number of new books have recently been ordered by the book committee of the library
