Fibreville Youngsters Collect 10 Tons Of Scrap



Children of the Fibreville community have done a fine piece of work in Canton's Scrap Collection Campaign. Over a three-days period the youngsters pictured above salvaged 10 tons of scrap materials. Included in the heap are heavy railroad irons, heavy shafts, iron wheels, and other materials considered excellent for scrap purposes. Several heavy pieces of a steel bridge, inundated for two years by the waters of nearby Pigeon river, were pulled from the river by the children and a few older persons of the Fibreville community. None of the youngsters claims any individual credit for the excellent piece of work, but they all agree "that we all did it and we are going to keep right on doing it for Uncle Sam."
