fabric uppers now in stock. Footwear which does not have a rubber sole and in which leather is used only as hinges, tabs, heel inserts or other non-skid or soundproofing features covering not more than 25% of the sole area:

Burial slippers.

Shoes with a platform and with heel height of 1 5-8 inches or less whose upper is made wholly of fabric, imitation leather, sheepskin, cape, or a combination of these materials.



Shoes with a platform and an open back, and with a heel height of 1 5-8 inches or less, whose upper is made of kipskin or kipsides, wholly or in combination with fabric, imitation leather, sheepskin or cape.

Shoes with a heel height of 1 5-8 inches or less whose upper is made wholly of imitation leather.

Shoes, sandals, with a heel height of 1 1-8 inches or less, with an open back, whose upper is made wholly of fabric, imitation leather, sheepskin, cape or a combination of these materials.

About Shoe Rationing

"Buy shoes as you have always bought them. Don't be rushed into spending more money for shoes than you need to. Continue to get the best dollar for dollar values when you spend your Stamp 17."

Shoe stamps are transferable. For example, a family with four children can buy six pairs between now and June 15.

3. Also remember that if an individual has less than two pairs of wearable or repairable shoes of the type he needs and has spent his stamp and cannot use a family stamp, he may apply to his local Board for a Certificate to purchase
