 The health department laboratory has examined 10,868 blood specimens for syphilis during the year

with 307 positive and 10,556 negatives. One hundred and four specimens were examined for gonorrhea with 19 found positive and 85 negative; 48 specimens were examined for diphtheria with 8 positive and 40 negative; 34 specimens of sputum have been exam-

ined for tuberculosis with 4 found positive and 30 negative; 398 specimens of feces for parasites have been examined with 6 positive and 392 negative. Four widal examinations were made with 1 positive and 3 negative; 1 specimen was examined

for Vincents infections and found positive; 3 specimens of blood were examined for malaria, all found negative; 124 blood counts; 498 urinalysis; 176 milk analysis; and 97 water analysis, were made, making a grand total of 12,351 specimens examined.

Special groups given blood tests for syphilis were: 2,182 high school boys, with none positive; draftees, 2,227, with 56 found positive; industrial plants, 1,997, with 11 found positive; for marriage, 90, with no positives; and prenatal cases 265 with no positives
