A procedure is being worked out through county war boards of the department of agriculture for assisting farmers in making their applications for non-highway gasoine. The Haywood County Board of Commissioners will sit as a Board of Equalization and Review beginning Monday, March 15th, at the commissioner's office in the Court House in the town of Waynesville, for the purpose of examining and reviewing the tax list of each township for the current year and shall hear any and all taxpayers who own or control taxable property assessed for taxation in the county, in respect to the valuation of all property in the county and correct any errors appearing on the abstracts, and for the transaction of any other business which may come before the board in compliance with the Machinery Act of 1937. This is the only time in which the commissioners have the authority to change valuation of real estate.
