

### State Interested In Feeder Calf Sale At Clyde

T. Lenoir Gwyn, cattle marketing specialist with the State Department of Agriculture, has announced plans for special feeder calf sales to be held in North Carolina during the next two months.

Two sales will be held at Clyde, West Jefferson, and a third will probably be conducted in Alleghany County, according to Gwyn.

He said that reports received by the Department indicate that a large number of high-grade calves will be consigned to all the feeder calf sales. He expressed the opinion that there will be a good demand for the quality calves.

The State Department of Agriculture will sponsor the sales, according to Gwyn, and only calves of good breeding, weighing 250 to 500 pounds, are being solicited.

Representatives of the State College Extension Service and county agents will assist in grading the calves into uniform lots according to breeding, size, and quantity.

The first sale will be held at the Haywood Mutual Stockyards at Clyde on September 13, and at the West Jefferson Stockyards on September 20, Gwyn said.

"Some outstanding calves at these sales will be sold separately to enable boys interested in feeding 4-H Club calves to make their selections," said Gwyn.

Plans are for the Department of Agriculture to move the calves in carload lots to a central distributing point in Eastern North Carolina in order to save transportation and traveling expenses.

Gwyn asserted that assistance in making purchases or any other information will be furnished by the Markets division of the State Department of Agriculture.

### Lt. Paul R. Calhoun Directs Supply Flow Of Essentials To Army In France

Headquarters, European Theater of Operations—In charge of four branches of the Quartermaster Section, First Lieutenant Paul R. Calhoun, 34, of Route 2, Waynesville, is stationed at a United States Army general depot in England.

As property officer at the services of supply base Lt. Calhoun supervises activities in the property branch, the stock record section, the requirements and initial issue section, and the depot sales branch.

The property branch is charged

with the maintenance of all records relative to property accountability. The stock record section maintains records of all items on hand. The requirements and initial issue section has jurisdiction over the supplies needed by the various requisitioning organizations in Great Britain and Normandy, and the depot sales branch supervises local sales of clothing, equipment and subsistence.

Lt. Calhoun attended Waynesville high school, and Eastman College at Poughkeepsie, New York.

Before entering the service he was purchasing agent and manager of the S. S. Kresge Company at Utica, New York. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph A. Calhoun of Waynesville.

One brother, Joe D., is a Staff Sergeant in the Corps of Engineers, and a brother, Samuel, is a private in the Air Forces.

**Plant Soybeans Early**  
Planting early maturing soybeans will permit a longer harvest season during favorable weather. Many farmers were unable to gather at least a part of their 1942 soybean crop because the beans ripened late, and rains made harvesting impossible soon after the beans matured.

### Drive Started To Wipe Out Black Market Gasoline

"Allied bombers and fighters over Europe burn more gasoline in one day than all the 'A' book holders here at home," said G. F. Ball of the Standard Oil Company of New Jersey, Charlotte, and special assistant to the Chairman of the Petroleum Industry Committee on rationing, here this week. "That is why it is not anticipated that there will be any additional gasoline available for motorists this summer." The Petroleum Industry is cooperating with the Government through advertising and other means to inform the public of the true situation on gasoline and combat the traffic in black market coupons.

"Gasoline is one of the principal weapons of this war," he said. "Naturally, military needs come first, but misuse of our limited home supply robs millions of honest car owners—doctors, war workers, and others who must use a limited amount of gasoline. Slowing down the war effort at home actually jeopardizes the lives of our fighting men. The government, the public, and every employee of the Petroleum Industry must cooperate to stamp out the black market in gasoline."

Staff Sgt. Mack E. Robinson, son of Mrs. Early Browning and the late R. F. Robinson of Hazelwood, who was wounded in France on July 13, has arrived in this country and is now a patient in the Ashford General Hospital at White Sulphur Springs, West Va.

Sgt. Robinson left here with the National Guard unit in Sept., 1940, and before going overseas received his training at Fort Jackson, Camp Blanding, Camp Forrest and Artterbury, Ind.

His wife, the former Miss Aleatha Messer, and his mother, Mrs. Browning, have gone to White Sulphur Springs to visit him.

Prior to entering the service Sgt. Robinson was employed by the A. C. Lawrence Leather Company.

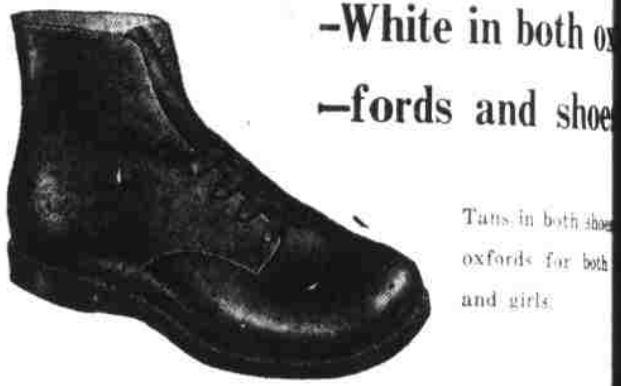
