Wayne C. Garrett Is Promoted To Corporal

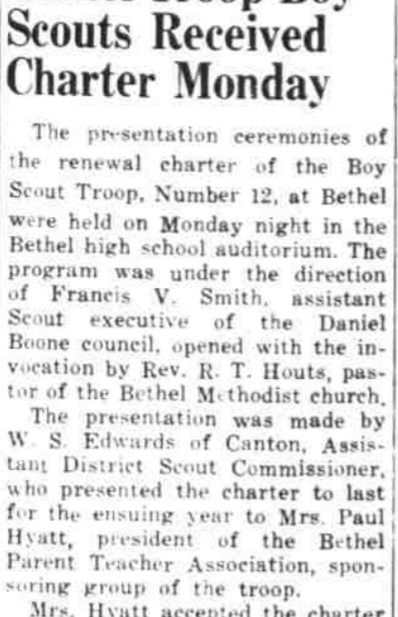
