



LSM Ships Honor Haywood County For War Bond Sales



The Governor was accorded military honors as he and his party arrived at the building ways,




Central Shop Committee, representing the men and women who built the ships. Mrs. Leinbachand Mrs. Broughton received large bouquets of flowers.
