The OPA has set ceiling prices on two types of Army shoes for men, which the Treasury Procurement Division proposes to sell for civilian use. The overall rubber problem remains far from solved and Allied crude rubber stocks are now at the lowest since the start of the war, the Combined Raw Materials Board reports. 


