An Explanation and A Correction

As a citizen of Haywood County and as a licensed Attorney in the State of North Carolina, (which includes the Town of Waynesville) I desire, through the press to acquaint the public with the true facts surrounding the institution of the action in the Superior Court of Haywood County by Paul Young, and others, against the Twin City Bus Service and the Town of Waynesville.

The Code of Legal Ethics forbids the airing of lawsuits through the newspapers, but I desire to correct the erroneous impression conveyed to the public, by the quoted statement published in the issue of The Mountaineer dated November 30, 1944, in the article referring to the above entitled action.

There is no suggestion sponsored by the pleadings filed therein, nor will there be a suggestion promoted by the evidence of the plaintiff at the hearing, which could convey to the public, that there is any desire on the part of the plaintiff, or anyone else connected therewith, to hinder or in any wise obstruct the operation of a City Bus Service, with designated routes, schedules and stops, as provided by law. This service, properly operated, can only result in great benefits to the community; and the community, as a whole, should feel grateful to Mr. Lee as the sponsor, and to the Town of Waynesville in their co-operation, with Mr. Lee, in granting to him such privilege, as the law allows, to so operate a City Bus Service.

When I was employed in this matter, I studiously examined the law, which I deemed pertinent to the issue, and in consequence of my findings and interpretation of the law, I consulted the Mayor of the town. I had reasons to believe we were in perfect accord after our discussion, and several days later, when that conference had borne no fruit, I consulted the Business Manager of the town, and he too,

seemed in complete accord with me. Some days later, while still representing my clients, and so far failing to register my efforts to bring about an adjustment of this matter, I consulted the Alderman whom I had been advised by the Business Manager of the town, had charge of the matter, to wit, W. H. Massie. I had long drawn-out discussion with this member, and I was advised by him, that immediate action would be taken to place this bus concern on designated routes, schedules and stops, as the law provided it should be operated. This venture likewise bought no results, and I then resorted to legal procedure to protect my clients.

I recall that there is a Maxim of the Common Law which says: "The King can do no wrong". In the trial of this action we will endeavor to determine who is King with what authority he sits the Throne and whence came his powers. In this connection I desire to quote, from a letter received by me, through the United States Mails, from the Office of Defense Transportation, Charlotte, North Carolina: "For your information, we do not have an effective Certificate of War Necessity covering any operation by Tom Lee. If he is at the present time, operating any Bus or Taxi Service in the Town of Waynesville, or any other Town, so far as our records indicate, he is in absolute violation of the rules and regulations of the ODT. This matter should be called to the attention of Local War Price and Rationing Board, or reported to this office."

"We do, however, have an application from Mr. Tom Lee to inaugurate a bus transportation service for transporting workers of the Dayton Rubber Manufacturing Company." Signed L. F. MAN- NESCHMIDT, District Manager.
