### Ernie Pyle Is Killed By Japs

To the long list of war casualties is added another—name beloved by the American people — Ernie Pyle, the greatest front-line correspondent the war has produced, who was killed on the little island of Ie near Okinawa.

Pyle, Scripps Howard war correspondent, came close to death countless times as he covered the war in Africa, Sicily, Italy and France. He came home for a furlough when the Americans began their march through Germany. He did not want to get back or for he had seen all he could take of the "50's" and smell of death, but as things began to get more active in the Pacific he felt he owed it to the American fighters to get back and write of what was taking place in that area.

President Truman said of him when he heard the news: "The nation is quickly saddened again by the death of Ernie Pyle. No man in this war has so well told the story of the American fighting man and the American fighting man wanted it told. More than any other man he became the spokesman for the ordinary American in arms doing so many extraordinary things. Nobody knows how many individuals in our forces and at home he helped with his writings. But all Americans know how wisely how war heartedly, how honestly he served his country and his profession. He deserves the gratitude of all his countrymen."
