Seaman Ralph Phillips Discharged From Navy

Ralph Phillips, seaman, second class, son of Mr. and Mrs. A. V. Phillips, of Waynesville, has been honorably discharged from the U. S. Navy and has arrived home.

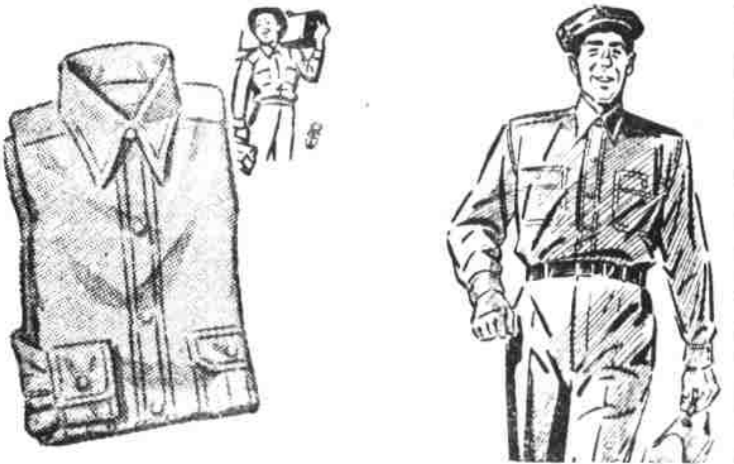
