T. N. Massie Heads Wild Life Group In Ninth District

T. N. Massie, business man and sportsman of Sylva, was elected chairman of the ninth district, North Carolina Wild Life Federation, Inc. by representatives of the Federation at the 9th district meeting in Asheville Friday night. Ronald Everett, of Brevard, was elected vice-chairman and W. O. Searles, of Robinsville, secretary-treasurer at the same meeting.

About 250 men from eight of the eleven counties in the district attended the meeting at which much enthusiasm was evidenced for the program as planned by the Federation. The principal speaker for the occasion was Clarence L. Bullock, of Forest City, who spoke on "The Need of Better Game and Fish Management in North Carolina." Assistant of a Department of Game and Fish stressed the importance of immediate action on a long range program, for bringing the game and fish back in numbers where this state can take its rightful place as a paradise for hunters and fishermen.

Ross Stevens, State secretary of the Federation, read the proposed bill to be placed before the next General Assembly for the establishment of a Department of Game and Fish, creating a nine man board, of men who know game and fish and who are interested in increasing our wild life. This would be a staggered board and not subject to a four-year turn over in personnel as is the case in a political set-up of the present Board of Conservation and Development fall than ever before.

FACTS ON FINGERLINGS, and other fish

DE Willis King, North Carolina's supervising fish biologist, has facts on fish being distributed in western waters. Stocking began March 1 and will continue through June, featuring the release of over one-third million trout of assorted shapes and sizes.

His figures show the release of approximately 30,000 legal length over six inches long, 150,000 medium fingerlings four to six inches—most of which will be legal length by June 1—and 150,000 small fingerlings measuring one to three inches. The state hatcheries supply comprises over a million trout eggs and fingerlings.

Stocking is being effected from hatcheries at Marion, Waynesville, Pineola, and Roaring Gap. Fish will be distributed first to publicly owned and leased waters open to all anglers and then to other streams, rivers, and lakes, and ponds suitable for stocking which are under private management.

Shorter Season For Deer Will Be Discussed Friday

Closed deer hunting in western North Carolina while deer trapping and redistribution is effected will be the subject of a public conference in the courthouse in Marion Friday morning. The meeting convenes at 10:30 and John D. Findlay, State fish and game commissioner, is urging all interested persons to attend.

Citing literally thousands of acres of understocked or barren areas, Commissioner Findlay has advocated closed deer season in Piedmont and Western North Carolina and reduction from 90 to 47 days hunting in eastern counties. The Division plans to trap and redistribute deer from Pisgah and Mt. Mitchell Preserve to other areas of the west suitable to their culture.

The division's proposals along with views of citizens of western North Carolina will be presented at the May meeting of the Board of Conservation and Development for action. Meanwhile, plans are being aired at public meetings in order to provoke better understanding and cooperation in areas affected.

Here's Customer Who Wants Ticket To Moon

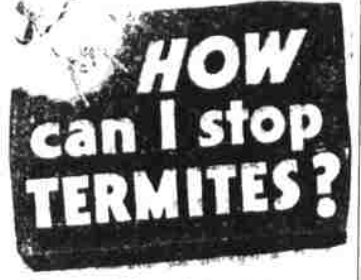
SANTA MONICA, Cal.—When and if the first atomic-powered rocket ship takes off for the moon, violin teacher Millard Williams wants to go along.

Construction Limitation Order

The Civilian Production Administration and the National Housing Administration have just released jointly the following information to builders and prospective home builders: Effective March 26, 1946, any work started prior to March 26th may be completed without permission. A job started means "work on which materials that are to be an integral part of the structure have been incorporated into the structure on the site at which is being carried on at the time of issuance of the order." The order does not apply to construction, repair, or installation jobs on which the cost does not exceed the allowance listed below.

Allowance Exemptions

- Houses designed for occupancy by five or fewer families, farm houses or other structures, such as a garage, on residential property, \$400.
- Hotel, resort, apartment house or other residential building designed for occupancy by more than five families, \$1,000.
- Commercial or service establishments, such as office, store, garage, theater, warehouse, radio station, gas service station, \$1,000.
- Farm buildings, excluding farm houses, \$1,000.
- Church, hospital, school, public buildings, charitable institutions, \$1,000.
- Factory, plant, or other industrial structure used for manufacturing, processing, or assembling; logging and lumber camp, utility structures, gas of petroleum refining or distribution except service stations and garages, \$15,000.
- Other structures not listed in above general classes, \$200.

Authorization for Work Above Dollar Limits

Application for construction jobs costing more than allowable amount will be handled as follows:

- For housing jobs, use Form CPA-4386, file with FHA. Greenhouses and farm housing applications are filled out on the same form, and filed with AAA office, County Court House.
- For farm buildings other than housing, application on a CPA form should be filed with the AAA office.
- For all other construction or repair work, application on a CPA form should be filed with the CPA, Greensboro.

No person may sell or deliver materials which he knows or has reason to believe will be used in work prohibited under this order, nor may any person either carry on or participate in work prohibited by this order.

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
