On Tuesday night, the 16th, she will speak to a joint meeting of the Parent-Teacher Associations of the East Waynesville, Central Elementary and the Hazelwood schools in the auditorium of the latter.

On Wednesday afternoon, the 17th, she will address the Parent-Teacher Association at Clyde.

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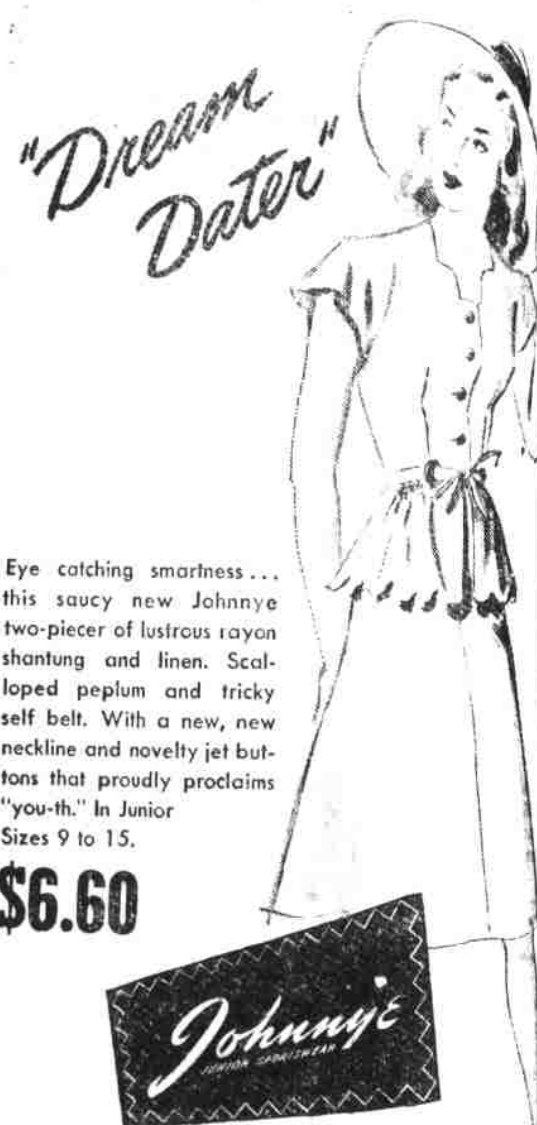
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
