A native of Kinston, North Carolina, Dr. Jordan graduated from Trinity College in 1917. He holds the B. D. degree from Emory, A. M. from Yale and D. D. from Duke.

In 1937 he was one of seven delegates of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, to the World Conference on Faith and Order in Edinburgh, Scotland. In the same year he also attended the World Conference on Life and Work at Oxford, England, as associate delegate.

Dr. Jordan has written a number of books including "What Is Yours?", "The Intolerance of Christianity," "Intimate Interests of Youth," "Courage That Propels," "We Face Calvary—and Life," "Adventures in Radiant Living," "Why the Cross," and "Look At The Stars."

In addition, he has contributed to "After Pentecost What?" "These Prophetic Voices," and "The Spiritual Diary." He has been contributing editor to "Through the Bible" and has also written for Christian Century, Christian Century Pulpit, Church Literature, Church Management, Christian Advocate, Upper Room, and Evangelism in the Sunday School.

Polio Ruling Not To Affect Campers

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Most of the camps have sufficient time before their opening dates for their respective campers to take advantage of two weeks

quarantine and be eligible to attend the camp when it opens.

In the case of Camp Junaluska where the students come from around 28 states, there will be time enough for all those who come from polio-infected areas to be quarantined for the designated two weeks, it was learned from Miss McCoy who gives June 26 as the opening day of camp.

Dr. Reynolds, state health officer, has explained that persons wishing to take advantage of this provision would have to make arrangements personally with the camp or school which they propose to attend.

The health officer said he deemed it "wise to advise that Florida children under 16 not be allowed to come to North Carolina in order to avoid possible exposure not only to children who are residents of this state but those who may have come to North Carolina from sections that are free from infection."

New Regulations
The regulation adopted by the state board yesterday said:

"1. Children under 16 years of age from any area within or outside of North Carolina that is declared by the North Carolina state health officer to be a poliomyelitis epidemic area, or an area where spread of that infection is impending, in the opinion of the North Carolina state health officer, shall be required to undergo a 14-day period of quarantine in an area segregated from hotels, tourist camps, summer schools, summer camps or other public gathering places."

"2. Summer camps, summer schools or other public establishments shall be permitted to admit residents from such an epidemic area without observing a quarantine period provided that admissions to such establishments are confined to residents from the epidemic area, and further provided that such establishments remain under quarantine for a period to include two weeks after the last resident from such an area has arrived."

"3. The above prohibition shall not apply to out-of-state residents having private homes in North Carolina provided that any such child under 16 years of age of such resident shall undergo a 14-day period of quarantine on their premises after leaving the epidemic area."

Reynolds Statement
Dr. Reynolds said in a statement made after the board acted said:

"It is deemed wise to advise that Florida children under 16 not be allowed to come to North Carolina in order to avoid possible exposure not only to children who are residents of this state but those who may have come into North Carolina from sections that are free from infection."

"Should children from Florida be allowed to come to North Carolina, arrangements should be made in advance for their quarantine in order that serious complications be avoided."

The regulations adopted recently said that the State Board of Health had been informed by the Florida Board of Health that so far this year 193 cases of infantile paralysis have been reported in Florida and that 69 of these cases have been reported within the past 30 days.

In addition, the regulation said, the board of health has received reports from Texas that "there exists in Bexar county of that state a large number of cases of infantile paralysis."

Because of these reports, the North Carolina Board said that in its opinion "a dangerous condition exists in the state of Florida and in Bexar county, Texas, with the disease still on the increase in those areas."

Leopard-Moody Trial Scheduled For Next Week

The condition of Henry Leopard, who was alleged to have been shot by Everett Moody last Sunday evening, as the former was entering the Moody home after he had been denied entrance by the owner, is reported to be improving.

It was reported at the time of the shooting that Leopard had jumped on Thurman Moody, father of Everett Moody, and the latter had demanded that Leopard leave him alone. Leopard is said to have started into the house of Moody, daring him to fire at him, when the latter shot at him.

Moody came into the sheriff's office and gave himself up after Leopard was taken to the hospital for treatment. He made bond for \$1,500.

The case is scheduled to be tried sometime next week in magistrate's court, pending the condition of Leopard.
