For Sale Sign Is Put On Mt. Wilson

PASADENA, Calif.—Famed Mount Wilson, site of the world's largest telescope and future television center of the West, goes on sale today bearing a price tag of \$425,000.

Albert C. Childs, whose Pasadena-Mount Wilson Toll Road Company owns the near-by 6,000-foot peak, wants to retire. There will be plenty of bidders, he figures, because already he has been approached by 30 radio stations, newspapers and other interests seeking sites on Mount Wilson for television transmitters.

Mt. Wilson Observatory, operated by the Carnegie Institution of Washington, doesn't go with the deal. The institution was given a 9-year lease for \$1 in 1904 for 15 acres on the summit.

The Mt. Wilson 100-inch telescope will continue to hold world honors for size until a 200-inch star-scraper, now nearing completion at California Institute of Technology, is installed sometime next year atop Mt. Palomar, 60 miles south.
