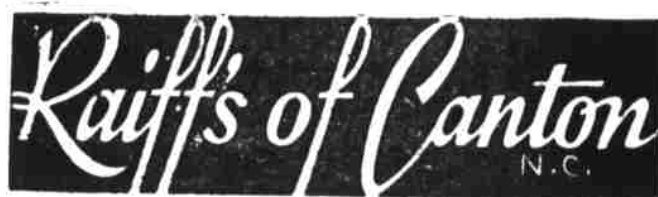

VEGETABLES

The Department of Agriculture predicts that there will be plenty of vegetables next year and that prices will be lower. In spite of continued high employment and wages. Supplies of canned and frozen vegetables between now and the 1947 processing season will probably set a new record, according to the Department.

TERMINAL LEAVE PAY

Government machinery has shifted to high gear and is now pouring out some \$2,700,000,000 in terminal leave payments to veterans of World War II. An estimated 15,000,000 veterans are eligible to receive these payments.

WHEAT

This year's world wheat crop will be the largest since 1942, according to the Department of Agriculture, and will be the means of further easing the fears of another mass famine this winter and next spring. World production is estimated at about 5,875,000,000 compared with only 5,150,000,000 last year. This compares with a pre-war average of 5,914,000,000 bushels.

1946 COTTON CROP

On the basis labor, prices and

production forecasts, farmers' cash receipts from the 1946 cotton crop will be the highest since 1925 or \$1,750,000,000 compared with \$1,250,000,000 last year and \$750,000,000 for the pre-war yearly average, according to the Department of Agriculture.

BIBLES

About 1,000,000 Bibles, left from the 11,000,000 purchased by the Government for morale purposes during the war, will be given to religious, educational and charity organizations by the War Assets Administration. The Bibles, of pocket size, are of different versions, some King James, some Douay and others prepared for men of Jewish faith.

CHILE

Five American battleships, including the Battleship Wisconsin, will be sent to Chile to represent the United States Government at the inauguration of President-elect Gonzales Videla, on Nov. 4-5. Besides the 45,000-ton Wisconsin, the task force will include the 27,000-ton carrier Leyte and three destroyers, the Massey, W. H. Fox and Joseph P. Kennedy.

18 Students From Haywood Enrolled Now At Mars Hill

Eighteen students from Haywood county are among the 901 enrolled at Mars Hill college this fall, according to a report from the registrar's office.

These are: William Kent Brooks, Doris Elizabeth Brown, Martin Cavanaugh, Max James, La Verne Rush, Dean Farris of Clyde; Charles William Davis, James J. Edwards, Henry B. The report also shows that 76 counties of North Carolina, 16 states, the District of Columbia and Cuba are represented among the 901 enrolled. Of these, 480 are men, 421 women, and 276 are former service men and women. For the first time since before the war more men than women are enrolled at the college.

Like most of the colleges, Mars Hill was flooded with applications this year and was able to accommodate only about two-thirds of those who applied.
