TITHE PLAN PROPOSED TO PAY FEDERAL DEBT

WASHINGTON—(AP)—Senator George A. Wilson (R) of Iowa proposed recently that Congress order an annual payment of the public debt equal to one-tenth of estimated Government receipts.
