

### Plans Discussed For District UDC Meeting To Be Held Here In May

Mrs. Grover C. Davis had the paper of the afternoon at the February meeting of the Haywood Chapter of the United Daughters of the Confederacy which was held on Friday afternoon at "Windover" with Mrs. J. Harden Howell as hostess.

Mrs. Davis spoke on the life of Sidney Lanier, giving a number of his most outstanding poems, and telling of his place in American literature.

Prior to her part on the program, Mrs. Noble Garrett reviewed the organization magazine, reading in full an article regarding the placing of a bust of Sidney Lanier in the Hall of Fame.

During the business session, Miss Nancy Killian historian, told of the contest held at the Waynesville Township high school commemorating the birthdays of Lee and Jackson. She stated that Mark Rogers was the winner of the contest and was presented the regulation UDC medal, with his declamation "The South of Yesterday and Today"; Duane Oliver won second place and Danny McClure was given third place by the judges.

Boyd, vice president gave a report of a similar contest held at the Clyde high school in which Bruce Caldwell won the medal with his speech, "Great Among Men"; Thomas Snyder, second place and Bob Medford honorable mention.
