sale of beer within the corporate limits of said municipality. County commissioners and local governing bodies may adopt rules "fixing the hours of sale, the places of business to which license may be issued, the location of places of business which may engage in the sale of beer, and may at its discretion prescribe the terms and conditions upon which a license may engage in the sale of beer."

After such resolutions are passed any person, firm or corporation, therefore licensed to sell beer, shall have thirty days from the passage of such resolution in which to dispose of such stock of beer.

Nothing in this Act shall pre-

conducted in the health offices of the afternoon of May 9. The State Board of Health advises the following protection for babies and children: At three months of age, vaccination for smallpox; at six months of age, to begin combined whooping cough and diphtheria immunizations and continue for a total of three doses at monthly intervals or at six months plain whooping cough in four doses at weekly intervals; and follow up at from 8 to 9 months plain diphtheria toxoid for 2 or 3 doses at monthly intervals.

From the age of 2 to 2 1/2 years, a booster dose of combined or each of the toxoids, diphtheria and whooping cough; at the age of 5 years, another booster of toxoids and repeat the smallpox. If the smallpox vaccination is repeated every 5 to 7 years there is rarely a second "take" scar.

Sometimes between the 3rd and 6th years a series of 3 typhoid doses, given at intervals of a week or ten days. It is necessary to booster the typhoid immunity by giving a dose of typhoid vaccine each year. It is strongly urged that the series of three doses be given before the child enters school.
