State Tobacco Averages \$49.01

RALEIGH (AP)—North Carolina tobacco farmers received an average \$49.01 for every 100 pounds of their tobacco and sold more than one-billion pounds during the 1946-47 sales season.

W. P. Hedrick, tobacco market specialist for the North Carolina Department of Agriculture, reported that the 49-dollar average was \$8.50 higher than the tobacco brought the previous season.

The Border Belt averaged \$51.81, the Eastern Carolina Belt averaged \$52.68, while the middle belt averaged \$47.20. The Old Belt averaged \$44.16.

The Burley tobacco markets of Asheville and Boone sold 11,902,988 pounds for an average of \$41.26 a hundred pounds.
