Water System

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The first speaker, getting water from a well or spring is a drudgery, usually the lot of the farmer's wife, that takes up much of the family's time and makes farm life less attractive to its young people because of the lack of conveniences. "You can't say that modern water is a luxury on the farm; it's more a necessity there than in town," he asserted. Milk and egg production depend upon supplying cows and chickens all the water they want.

"This is a different day for the farmer than when I was a youngster. You must plan to get the most out of your place and keep up with the ones you compete with. Many of you cannot afford to install a whole, modern, shiny system; but plan what you can do and get started as soon as you can."

Elmer Davis, TVA engineer, discussed the points to be kept in mind when installing a water system. He described the advantages of rams, shallow and deep well pumps, the placing of storage tanks, planning a system of pipes and outlets, and precautions to take against freezing weather and fire. He and H. L. Livingston, district sanitarian, then talked over the septic tank and other sewage disposal systems which are best for rural use.

During the afternoon Mr. Woody spoke, after which Pauline Gordon, home management specialist, talked on using water in the house. Several numbers were presented by the Waynesville township high school double quartet.
