

### American Legion Auxiliary To Hold Annual Poppy Sale On May 24th

The local auxiliary of the American Legion post will sponsor the annual sale of memorial poppies here on May 24, according to an announcement by Mrs. J. Colvin Brown, who will serve as chairman of the event.

The auxiliary committee in charge of the sales has ordered 1,500 poppies, which will be supplied by the disabled veterans of Fayetteville, who are rushing completion of the work.

The making of the poppies at the hospitals or workshops throughout the United States is directed by the rehabilitation department of the auxiliary which provides the materials, instructs the workers and pays for the flowers produced. Veterans of both World Wars are employed, the older and younger men working side by side making flowers, some for the first time.

The work is enjoyed by the men who benefit by it in two ways, explained Mrs. Brown. First in making the poppies they are benefited as occupational therapy, providing interesting work for the hands during the long days of hospitalization and convalescence, and second the money enables the veterans to help provide for themselves and their families, along with the task serving as a powerful morale builder.

"Because of the interested public response to the legion and the auxiliary Poppy Day appeal, more veterans are being given employment this year than ever before," stated Mrs. Brown.

"Every person who wears a poppy on Poppy Day not only pays tribute to the war dead, but helps the war's living victims toward recovery and rehabilitation," further explained Mrs. Brown, who requests that all persons who aided in the sale last year take part this year.

WASHINGTON — If American women were to turn out in full force at the polls in 1948, they could outvote the men by more than a million.

With more than 50 per cent of the electorate composed of women, they could, if they were to band together, control practically all of the public offices in the country.

Representative Margaret Chase Smith (R) of Maine reminded Republican women recently.

A vigorous campaign to awaken American women to their voting sinew and responsibilities, come election year, is being waged by both of the major political parties.

Spearheading the Democratic drive is Mrs. Chase Going Woodhouse, former Representative from Connecticut, whose own experience illustrates how women often fail to support other women in office.

That they do not do so is obvious also from the fact that there are only seven women in the 80th Congress out of a total membership of more than 500, and only 210 in state legislatures out of a total of more than 7,500 members.
