Champs Defend Title In First Match Saturday

Hazelwood's journey to Enka for their first tilt of the year Saturday, with the game to get under way at 3:30 p.m.

The opening game will be followed with two week-end scraps on the local field against Enka on May 3 and Martel on May 10. The schedule also is highlighted by a July 4th (Friday) game here against Champion Y, and another game on the 5th with Green River.

Manager Bud Blalock has been carrying out practice sessions each afternoon this week and plans to start the game on the mound with Jack "Sheriff" Smith behind the plate.

Probable starting infielders are Eugene Wyatt on first, Stan Henry on second, Ervin Shook or Lawrence Robinson at shortstop, Billy Boyle or Ken Troutman at third.

Likely to begin play in the outfield are Oliver Yount, Elmer Dudley and Bob Pitts.

89-DAY TROUT SEASON IN MANAGEMENT AREAS

A fishing season which will offer a schedule of five days a week in trout streams of the cooperative wildlife management areas of Pisgah and Nantahala National Forests has been worked out by the N. C. Division of Game and Inland Fisheries and the U. S. Forest Service.

First fishing date in the management areas is April 29, when the South Toe River and tributaries in the Mt. Mitchell Wildlife Area of Pisgah will be open. After the opening week, the season will be in full swing, and on every day except Monday and Tuesday of each week there will be streams open somewhere in the forests until August 31, when the State's trout season winds up.

Opening dates for the Pisgah areas are: Mt. Mitchell—April 29; Pisgah Game Preserve—May 3; Sherwood Forest—May 7; and Daniel Boone—May 10. Openings for the Nantahala areas are: Chiselside Lake, Wayah Bald, and Sautetlah—May 3; Standing Indian and Fires Creek—May 10.

ANOTHER CUT IN SIGHT FOR WATERFOWL SEASON

Preliminary addition of the season on North American waterfowl ports a warning to sportsmen that Federal officials will have to perform another trimming operation on the hunting season and bag limits.

Last year's regulations, which the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service rated the most drastic in history, cut the shooting period from 89 to 45 days, reducing the duck bag limit from 10 to seven a day, and lopped half an hour from the shooting hours.

Now, word from Albert M. Day, Director of the service on whose recommendations the Interior Department will base next fall's regulations, is that a clamp-down, but not a complete shutdown, on the shooting probably will be necessary.

He based his estimate on the service's annual waterfowl inventory, made last January at the close of shooting, which put the North American population of ducks and geese at 54,000,000, or 20,000,000 fewer than in January, 1946. This is the greatest one-year decline in the finest performances of the team.

the waterfowl population on record, Day said. The service's first inventory in 1935 resulted in an estimate of 27,000,000. The number increased annually to a peak of 125,200,000 in 1943.

In spite of the fact that waterfowl numbers have fallen almost to the 1939 total, I do not now think it will be necessary to establish a complete closed season for next fall, Day declared. "I think we will be able to recommend some kind of an open season, but what it will be depends largely upon conditions in the breeding grounds next summer."

"I guess drought conditions or other limiting factors are worse than we think, we should have a duck season and bag limit next fall not too greatly reduced from last year's," he added.

Day said the service must complete its observation on spring migrations and on summer breeding grounds in the northern states, Canada, and Alaska before making its hunting recommendations in July to the Secretary of the Interior.

The idea of a complete shutdown on shooting this year was brought up by the Audubon Society, recently in a recommendation to the Service. Day said the flood of mail to his office following the society's report "surprisingly enough balanced out pretty well a lot of sportsmen are worried and agreed that strict conservation is necessary."
