DURHAM—Ten of North Carolina's best known citizens have accepted invitations to serve as the judges in the first statewide contest to select "Miss N. C. Student Nurse of 1947."

The Good Health Association which is conducting the contest at the request and with the cooperation of the North Carolina State Nurses' Association and the North Carolina Hospital Association, announced today that Kay Kyser, famed entertainer from Rocky Mount who has spearheaded his home state's good health campaign, will head the slate of distinguished judges.

Others who will serve include Betty Smith Jones, of Chapel Hill, author of "A Tree Grows in Brooklyn"; Mrs. J. Melville Broughton, of Raleigh, wife of the former North Carolina governor; Mrs. R. S. Ferguson, of Taylorsville, only woman member of the 1947 General Assembly; Mrs. Blanche C. Gupton, of Charlotte, president of the North Carolina Federation of Women's Clubs; and Carl Goerch, of Raleigh, editor of the State Magazine.

Kyser will fly to the state from his home in Hollywood to attend the grand finals in the contest, which will be staged in the hall of the house of representatives, State Capitol, Raleigh, Tuesday night, July 1, at 8 o'clock. There will be no admission charge or solicitation and the public is cordially invited to attend.

The nine most beautiful and best-all-round student nurses in North Carolina, representing the different nursing districts of the state, will appear in person at the finals to compete for the title and a free week at Wrightsville Beach as the guest of the Southeastern North Carolina Beach Owners Association.

War Dead Return Sought By State

WASHINGTON — North Carolinians want their war dead brought back home and as soon as possible, it was revealed in a nationwide survey conducted by the Graves-Registration Bureau of the Army.

Questionnaires were mailed to next of kin of Tar Heel soldiers buried in government cemeteries on foreign soil. Description of the soldier's present resting place were furnished his family and inquiry made as to their wishes regarding final disposition of the soldier's remains.

While declining to release actual figures, Army spokesmen declared that "a very small percentage" of the North Carolina soldiers' kin requested that their loved ones be allowed to remain on the soil on which they fell.

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
