Some western red cedar trees are 18 feet in diameter and 200 feet high.

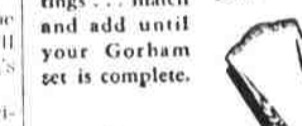

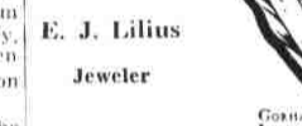

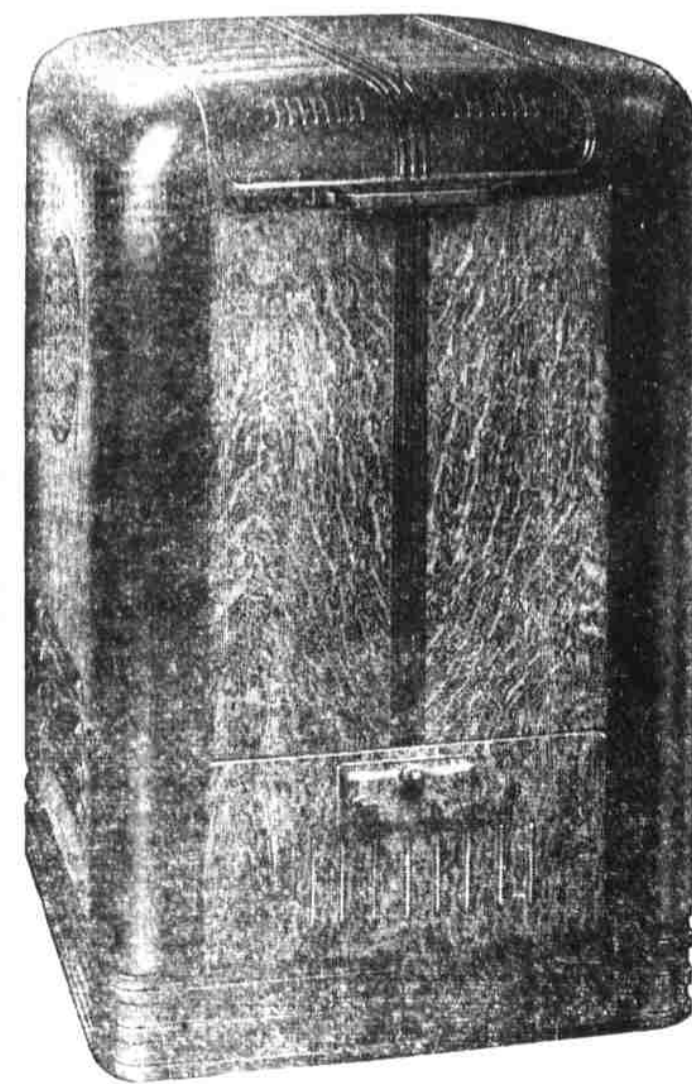
