Homemade Bread



CELERY OAT BREAD . . . For delicious sandwiches . . .

Most American housewives, regretfully, think it's too much trouble to make bread. We're bringing up a generation of youngsters who've never smelled that miraculous odor of bread just warm from the oven.

Even if you don't want to go into regular weekly or bi-weekly baking, to provide the entire supply, why don't you try making some really special breads for tea or luncheon sandwiches and the like? It's not hard and the rewards are plentiful.

Celery Oat Bread

- 1 1/2 cups rolled oats
- 1 cup sifted all-purpose flour
- 2 teaspoons baking powder
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1 teaspoon celery seed
- 2 tablespoons fat
- 3 tablespoons sugar
- 1 egg
- 1 cup milk

Spread two thirds of a cup of rolled oats out on a board and roll very fine with a rolling pin. Sift together the flour, baking powder and salt. Add all the rolled oats and the celery seed. Cream the fat. Add sugar and cream until light and fluffy. Add egg and beat thoroughly. Add milk and dry ingredients all at once and stir only enough to moisten dry ingredients. Turn into well greased loaf pan, and bake in a moderate oven (350-375 degrees) for 35 minutes. This makes one loaf.

That's a good kind of bread to have in these days of high cost for protein. Rolled oats contribute protein. Sandwiches made of this bread are particularly good when filled with softened cream cheese, peach preserves, or chopped egg.

Peach Nut Bread

- 1 cup sliced canned cling peaches
- 2 cups sifted flour
- 2 teaspoons salt
- 2 teaspoons baking powder
- 1/2 teaspoon baking soda
- 1/2 cup brown sugar (packed)
- 1/2 cup shortening
- 1/2 cup chopped, roasted unblanched almonds
- 2 eggs
- 1/2 teaspoon almond flavoring
- 1 tablespoon chopped almonds for top

Drain peaches, mash slightly and beat with a rotary beater until pulp is smooth. Sift together flour, salt, baking powder, baking soda and sugar. Cut in shortening until mixture resembles coarse meal. Add 1/2 cup almonds and mix well. Stir in well beaten eggs, peaches and flavoring and mix only until flour is dampened. Pour into greased and floured loaf pan. Sprinkle top with almonds and bake in a moderate oven (350°) about an hour. Cut in very thin slices.

This is such a richly satisfying bread, with so much flavor of its

own, that its best sandwich combination is with plain butter or margarine, or at most a thin film of softened cream cheese.
