Cigar Band Collector Has 50,000 Specimens

CHICAGO (U.P.)—Gilbert Budlow, a 33-year-old non-smoker from West Allis, Wis., probably is the cigar band king of the country.

He has a collection of 50,000 specimens and is president of the International Cigar Band Society. Budlow said he started his collection from a group of bands his mother had left over from a turn-of-the-century tin pasting them on glass ash trays, mirrors and vases. Present day collectors scorn such practice and keep their collections in neat loose leaf notebooks.

The collection was built up through trade contacts with cigar makers and plain butt snipping. "I've found one of my very rarest bands on curl stones and golf courses," Budlow confided.
