Song Of Haywood County Appears In State Magazine

Some years prior to the Civil War, Mrs. M. J. Branner wrote a poem entitled "Old Haywood Love Thee", and in 1914 Miss Margaret Stringfield set the poem to music.

The song appeared in the January 8 issue of The State Magazine. It is believed that Haywood county is the only county in North Carolina that has a county song.

This poem was written by Mrs. Branner, who was a daughter of James R. Love, when she was a school girl sixteen years of age according to an account of the poem and song in the Annals of Haywood County, written by W. C. Allen.

In 1914 the county board of education adopted the song for school purposes and 5,000 copies were printed and distributed to the schools. It still is being used by schools on special occasions.

County 4-H Club Achievement Day Set January 27

The Haywood County 4-H Club Achievement Day program will be held Thursday, January 27, starting at 10:30 o'clock in the court house, Wayne Corpening, county agent, reported this morning.

Judge Allen H. Gwyn of Reidsville will be principal speaker for the annual event.

Judge Gwyn is a renowned worker with the youth of North Carolina, especially among 4-H Clubs throughout the state. He recently proposed a plan for the city of Greensboro in which citizens who volunteer would be used as advisers to teen-age youths who have made mistakes and are placed on probation.

The proposal came after Judge Gwyn ran into difficulty in finding advisers for some youths found guilty in Guilford County Superior Court of criminal charges.

It would call for a filing system of citizens interests in helping guide such youths. They would receive instructions from the State Probation Department, and would augment the probation system.

George Smathers Chosen Among Ten Outstanding Young Men In Country

George A. Smathers, son of Judge and Mrs. Frank Smathers of Waynesville and Miami, representative in Congress, was chosen last week as one of the nation's ten outstanding young men of 1942 by the U. S. Junior Chamber of Commerce. In 1942 he received the Jaycee award as Miami's young man of the year.

Now 35, Mr. Smathers won the national recognition for his amendment to the immigration act of 1917 simplifying international travel and his generally progressive legislative program.
