MINNEAPOLIS (UP)-America's biggest "industry," the operation of its 42,000,000 homes, will waste at least \$349,231,650 this year, according to an analysis just completed by a Minneapolis concern. More than 54 per cent of the

nation's homes, or 23,282,110, are at least 30 years old and original equipment is beginning to show the ravages of time, the survey disclosed.
