Pairings Set For Community Cage Tournament

Thirty-eight teams will open play Monday night for the first Haywood County Community Development Program basketball championships.

Besides the boys' and girls' championship trophies, there will be three team sportsmanship awards to shoot for—honors which are rated equal or even higher in their classes than the title prizes.

The community teams are winding up their practice games this week and, if the tournament contests are anything like the engagements that they have been playing since October, this first annual event will be a dog-fight from the first rounds to the finals at Waynesville Township High School.

Officially, the race for the championships is wide open. There are no seedings.

But from the season's records, the Center Pigeon, and Iron Duff boys, and the Cruso and Center Pigeon girls will be among the most dangerous contenders.

The 38 teams will play in three divisions, depending on where their home communities are located, as follows:

Canton section—Center Pigeon, Morning Star, Thickety, Lake Pigeon, South Clyde, Cruso, Hominy, and West Pigeon;

Fines Creek section—Iron Duff, Lower Crabtree, White Oak, and Upper Crabtree;

Waynesville section—Allens Creek, Francis Cove, Lake Junaluska, Saunook, and Ratcliffe Cove. The games in the Canton section will be played in the Champion YMCA gym.

The first Waynesville section teams will play at the local high school, and the Fines Creek section contests are set for the Crabtree-Iron Duff School and the Fines Creek School.

The Crabtree gym will be the scene of the games in this latter section on Monday and Tuesday nights.

The rest of the week, through Friday night the games will be played at Fines Creek.

The teams which will play for the boys' and girls' championships will be decided Friday night March 24 in the last of the sectional play-offs.

The Canton section winners will be decided in games at the Champion "Y".

On the same night, the winners of the Waynesville section will meet the winners of the Fines Creek section in another double-header on the Crabtree court.

The survivors from the three sections will get together Saturday night at Waynesville to settle matters permanently.

The two girls' finalists will start off the proceedings at 7:30 P. M. The boys will meet for their title an hour later.

Meanwhile, Basketball Committee Chairman Jack Justice reminded coaches of the eligibility rules, and the requirements for filing their playing rosters and any protests they might feel inclined to make.

All varsity high school basketball players are barred, under one of the most important rules of tournament competition.

Another fundamental regulation is that all players who didn't see action with their community teams until after February 15 are ineligible for competition.

All players also must be bona-fide residents of the community which they represent.

In the games which will open the tournament simultaneously, the Center Pigeon and Morning Star girls will meet at 6 P. M. Monday for the opening gun of the section.

In the Waynesville division, it will be the Saunook girls vs the Ratcliffe Cove girls at 7:30 P. M. The Fines Creek tournament will open at 7:30 P. M., with the Upper Crabtree girls squaring off against the Fines Creek sextet.

CHICAGO (UP)—A metal jaw has been used to replace a lower jawbone removed from a patient because of cancer.

Dr. Arthur E. Smith, Los Angeles dentist, described the operation at a meeting of the Chicago Dental Society.

He said the metal jaw was non-irritating and could be "designed for each patient according to accurate measurements of the jaw."

The patient has movement of the jaw with his own muscles, which have been sewed to the metallic jaw, he said.

Haywood County Hospital

Shown at right is a picture of Haywood County Hospital, built in the latter part of 1927, it was officially opened in March 1928. At present it has a capacity of 75 beds. On October 1st, an election vote was passed to enlarge the Hospital with a new wing, adding another 50 beds. Architects Plans are expected to be completed within the next sixty days with actual building to begin about July 4th.
