WASHINGTON—P. T. Barnum with all his flair for the stupendous, could not have dreamed up such a benefit as the lady Democrats here are readying for April. A luncheon, a fashion show on a 115-foot runway, a state table decoration contest, a cocktail party, Mrs. Truman, diplomatic, cabinet and congressional wives—all figure in the affair to be given by the

Woman's National Democratic Club.

Hundreds of wives of prominent officials have been working for months on the benefit. Tickets have been sold at \$10 to more than 800. Proceeds go toward improvement of the organization's 26-year-old clubhouse, Mrs. James A. Murray, daughter-in-law of Senator James E. Murray (D-Mont.) is general chairman. There are 200 women en-

gaged in plans for the project. These include six regional chairmen and table chairmen for each of the 48 states, Hawaii, Alaska and Puerto Rico. Mrs. Charles Brannon, wife of the Secretary of Agriculture, is chairman of patronesses.

The luncheon will be served on the (Statler) hotel's white, blue and gold presidential china, brought out for all important "state" functions. Sample menus were tested by the committee before one was finally decided upon. The fashion show will be put on by Christian Dior, who is coming from Paris with his entire American collection.

Highlight of the benefit, however, will be the state table contest. Business firms and chambers of commerce from all states and territories are sending decorations. Mississippi is sending bouquets of baled cotton, Hawaii and Puerto Rico, fresh flowers. Nevada is sending a miniature silver mine. California is sending a scene from its gold rush days.

Competition is so keen that each state is pleading for more tables. The Missouri delegation, with Mrs. John Snyder, wife of the Treasury secretary, as chairman and Mrs. Truman as guest, has taken four. Mrs. O. Max Gardner, widow of the late ambassador-designate to Great

Britain, and Mrs. Gordon Gray, wife of the Secretary of the Army, are planning four for North Carolina.

Mrs. Truman will be seated at the head table with Mrs. Barkley, wife of the Vice President; Mrs. Julian Friant, president of the Woman's National Democratic Club; Mrs. J. Borden Harriman, club founder; Mrs. Woodrow Wilson, widow of the World War I president and Mrs. Murray.

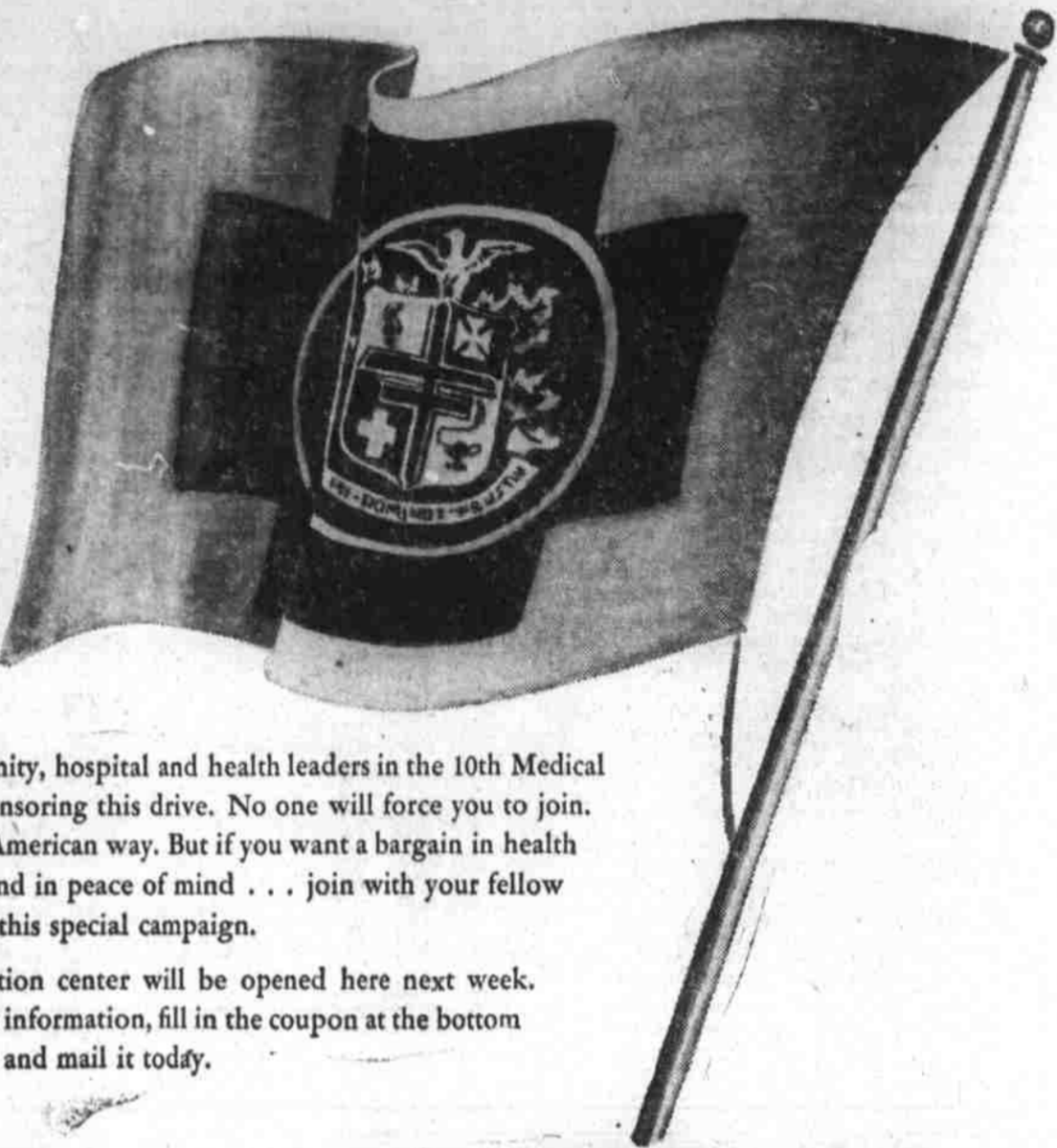
