Waynesville High School's baseball players will meet Mars Hill School's nine at 3:30 p.m. at the home field in the opener of the season for both teams.

Coach Marshall Teague sent Mountaineers through practice games this week in winding up preparations for their season's debut. He named these possible starters, but declared that this does not mean anybody has a monopoly on any varsity position for the rest of the season:

Starting Pitcher—Southway Jimmy Kuykendall, with right hander Bill Sutton to share the mound later. Both are juniors.

Catcher—James (Perk) Fugate, another junior; first base—Bobby Robinson, also a junior; second base—Sophomore Carol Swanger; third base—Freshman Joel Burrell or Junior Mark Hoaglen; shortstop—Freshman Bobby Kuykendall; outfield—Seniors Bob Davis, Charlie Womack, and Bobby Owen, with Sophomores Terry Swanger and Billy Whitener pushing hard for two of the jobs.

Coach Teague reported, meanwhile, that the squad had been cut from an initial turnout of 35 hopefuls down to 22. The travelling roster, however, will list only 14 boys.

## Wildlife Club Plans WNC Boys' Fish Rodeo, Casting Tournament For Summer

The Haywood County Wildlife Club last Monday night started the machinery to organize a western North Carolina Boys Fishing Rodeo this summer.

Fundamentally, the event will aim to indoctrinate with the principles of game conservation and sportsmanship the youngsters who will be the hunters and fishermen of the future.

Boys from six to 12 will compete in classifications set up on the basis of age.

A prize will be awarded for the biggest fish a contestant catches in his own age group.

Tom Campbell, Jr., president of the local club, said members of the Haywood Rod and Gun Club of Canton and the Jackson County Wildlife Club, as well as the Haywood organization, each will be invited to bring one boy to compete in the tournament.

At the same time, teams of anglers representing each of the clubs will compete for honors in a fishing tournament.

In connection with this double-barreled sports event, wildlife officials and sportsmen will give lectures and demonstrations illustrating the finest game conservation practices, ideas of sportsmanship in the field, and the best methods of preventing forest fires which take such a heavy toll of bird and animal life as well as valuable timber.

Named to the committee to arrange the day-long program were G. J. Reece of Waynesville, J. B. Smith of Hazelwood, and Guy Messer of Waynesville.

Further details of the event, including the specific time and the place, will be worked out later.

## Free Lespedeza Available To County Farmers

Farmers can provide a square meal for Haywood county's game birds and animals and a soil-conserving cover crop for themselves, all at the same time.

Tom Campbell, Jr., president of the Haywood County Wildlife Club, said today the farmers can get lespedeza free of charge from him.

The Commission supplies the seed on request to local game conservation clubs for distribution to farmers in their respective areas.
