The altar was decorated with white snapdragon and gladioli against a background of fern and branched candelabra holding white candles.

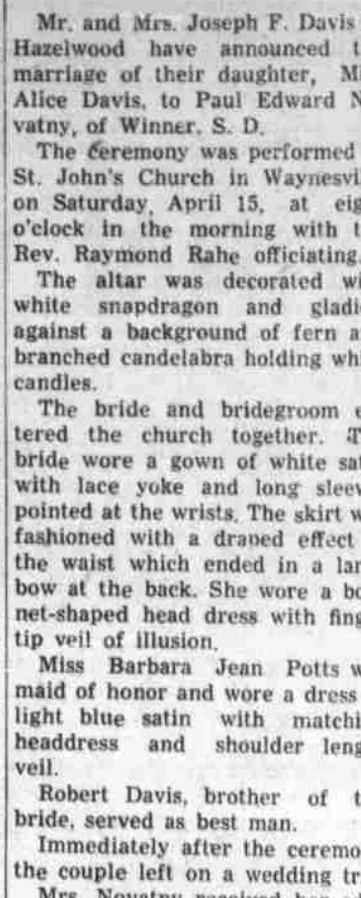
