Available at the pound (telephone 617-M, Montgomery Queen warden) until Monday, May 29th, are three young shepherd dogs, two eight months old, a male and female, and one four months old, a good pet for any outdoor youngster. The two older ones, it seems to them, are just about ready to be put to work with cattle and they'd like that a lot better than being put to sleep next Monday.

Before the week is out more good, sound animals ready to exchange loyalty, friendship and service for a good home, will be detained at the pound. The public may inspect them at any time. If you want a dog don't let these homeless strays be destroyed. They may be had for their impounding fee, \$1.00 and their board.

Gas to Preserve

Our Declaration

WASHINGTON (UP)—The Declaration of Independence and the Constitution soon will be preserved in a gas-sealed case.

The Library of Congress, custodian of the historic documents, claims the threat of drying and insect damage will disappear with use of gas.

The five pages of the Constitution and the single paged Declaration of Independence, whose extensive travels have contributed to their deterioration, will be sealed inside a glass container filled with an inert gas, probably helium. An inert gas is free of chemical reaction.

The bureau of standards, working two years to perfect the case, reports that a gauge will be attached to show any leaks and to assure proper temperature.
