

### Cherokee Drama Seen By 12,000 In Five Nights

In four nights of playing since opening Saturday, July 1, Mountain-side Theatre here, the Cherokee Drama, "Unto These Hills," has entertained close to 10,000 spectators.

Including dress rehearsal performance on Friday, June 30, at which some 2,500 Indians among others were guests, the spectacular stage drama has drawn over 12,000. Performances are scheduled nightly through Sunday, July 9, then five nights weekly, Wednesday through Sundays through Labor Day.

First of special nights honoring distinguished guests at Mountain-side will be observed Wednesday July 12 when Cardinal Spellman, Catholic prelate attending the Asheville, will attend. Manager Carol White, announced today that 500 seats would be held in a special section for Catholic reservation. Plenty of seats in all categories will be available to the general public.

A 36-page Souvenir Program of the Indian drama will be on sale Saturday, July 8, at the Theatre and at the general office at Cherokee Information Hut here.

Transportation and parking facilities in the Theatre area were given, and passed competently, a severe test Sunday, Monday and Tuesday when, as reported by National Parks Service, "the greatest traffic count in history was made on the trans-Park highway." Express bus service is maintained from Knoxville, Asheville and intermediate points by Smoky Mountain Stages and others. Free shuttle-bus service from parking lots on Cherokee Indian fairgrounds at the bottom of Theatre mountain has proven efficient and satisfactory.

### Musical Concert To Be Held At Lake Junaluska Tonight

Highlighted by excellent musicianship, warmth of feeling and deep spiritual significance, the Thursday Night Sacred Concert, presented by the Junaluska Ensemble under the direction of Cyrus Daniel, of Nashville, Tennessee, will mark a new high in musical execution and direction and pleased a large auditorium audience. The concert is an evening unit of the Institute of Church Music in session here, July 4-9. Friday night the auditorium attraction will be Oratorio Night when the Ensemble will present "Galla" by Gounod and Rossini's "Sabbat Mater".

The first part of Thursday's program will introduce the residence quartet in solos and duet. Kay Fryer, who has a clear, Lyric soprano, will sing "How Beautiful."

Sonia Young, who has depth in her rich contralto register, will sing "Hillier's Prayer."

Roland Felts and Katherine Fryer will sing a duet, "Love Divine," while Frank Love, baritone, will sing the dramatic solo, "Fear Not."

These four young artists are all from Nashville, Tennessee, where they hold church soloists positions. Mr. Daniel, heads the music department at Vanderbilt University and is choirmaster at First Presbyterian church in Nashville.

The second part of the program will feature a setting of the "Seven Last Words," by Mercadante, a contemporary of Verdi, and will display an almost operatic style in this dramatic, vivid setting.

Mr. Daniel at the organ, will play a colorful accompaniment while directing members of the ensemble. Betty Reiney, assistant organist, will play Prelude and Postlude with skill and understanding. Of the concerted numbers in Part II, "Verily I Say Unto Thee," and "Father, Into Thy Hands" will also be outstanding.
