5-DAY VETERAN SEEKS HUNTING LICENSE

SALEM, Ind. (UPI)—Earl Baxter, county clerk, is considering a request for a free hunting and fishing license by a veteran who served five days in World War I. The applicant was drafted into the Army and sworn in Nov. 11, 1918, the day the armistice was signed. His orders to report to camp were canceled and he was discharged later that same day. He received a \$1 check for his five-day service. Decision on whether his case will fall within the range of the free license law was postponed until later could study it.

Upon order of the Board of Elections of Haywood County, and pursuant to a Petition filed by the required number of qualified voters under the provisions of Chapter 18 of General Statutes of North Carolina and acts amendatory thereto, notice is hereby given that a special election will be held in all the precincts of Haywood County as now established, on Saturday, September 2nd, 1950, as provided by law, and that at said election there shall be submitted to the qualified voters of Haywood County the question of whether or not wine and/or beer shall be sold within the County of Haywood, and that in said election a ballot will be submitted to the voters containing the following:

Take The Sun — But Take It Easy

One painful sunburn can mess up your entire summer. Some girls pay the penalty for seeking to get in one day the sun tan it should take weeks to acquire. One long session in the sun can result in a scarlet back, freckles and dry skin which can ruin your goal to look like a bronzed goddess. Most of us realize that there must be a time limit to sunning. Why be anxious? If you take the sun in easy stages, you'll get a neatly tanned skin within a few weeks. Good sultan lotion as well as common sense is a help. There are lotions and lotions. Some new and highly touted ones contain para-aminobenzoic acid or hydroquinone to help filter out burning rays. It is wise to stay out of the sunlight during the hours between noon and 2 p.m. at first. You can get slightly red after just 20 minutes in the sun during these hours, vivid red after 50 minutes, painfully burnt after 100 minutes and blistered after 200 minutes, experts tell us. If you are a fair-skinned brunette, a red-head or a blonde you will have to take more precautions than the olive skinned person who will not burn easily. Very fair skinned girls, always get a slight burn over their tan and this "Pocahantas" look is much sought after, but can be accomplished only if you take your time. It is a good idea when you take a sunbath to take an alarm clock along. In that way you can time your exposure to the sun to the minute. Fifteen minutes the first day, providing you use a lotion, should be tops.

- Cooking Liver**
Calf or beef liver is cooked best at a very moderate heat for a very short time. It should be removed from the frying pan as soon as it has changed color throughout.
- Soil for Flats**
Soil from woods or uncultivated areas is good for use in flats for growing young plants, as usually such soil is fairly free from plant diseases such as damping-off.

RECOVERED HEART VICTIMS FOUND CAPABLE WORKERS

PHILADELPHIA (UP)—Persons recovered from heart attacks are better risks for employers than unimpaired workers, according to a heart specialist. Dr. L. S. Ylvisaker finds rehabilitated heart patients, as a group, are about two per cent more productive, while their records show them to be more dependable and grateful. He is chairman of the Philadelphia Heart Association's rehabilitation division. In industry with stabilized employment, the doctor said about eight per cent of the entire personnel have heart defects, and it has been shown that about 70 per cent of heart clinic patients are employable when properly placed. He urged employers to make job analyses to find which jobs can be efficiently handled by recovered cardiac patients.
