The public is invited to enter exhibits in 14 classifications, including flower arrangements or single specimens but the latter must be grown by the exhibitor.

- SECTION A**
  1. Arrangement for wall table.
  2. Arrangement for coffee table.
  3. Arrangement for informal luncheon table.
  4. Arrangement for buffet.
  5. Arrangement for tea table.
  6. Arrangement for breakfast tray.

- SECTION B**
  1. Large arrangement not over 36 inches.
  2. Large arrangement for porch or fire place.

- SECTION C**
  1. Arrangement in usual container.
  2. Nosegays.
  3. Oriental arrangement background accessories permitted.
  4. "Trim your Easter Bonnet." (Flowers must be kept in good condition for duration of the show.)

- SECTION D**
  1. Musical theme — Composition suggested by a song. Exhibitors may furnish own background. (Sheet of music, Musical instrument, etc.)

- SECTION E**
  1. Miniature arrangement not to exceed 3 inches in either dimension.
  2. Miniature not to exceed five inches in height.

- SECTION F**
  1. Arrangement of fruit and vegetables.
  2. Arrangement of fruit.
  3. Arrangement of vegetables.

- SECTION G**
  1. Arrangement in autumn colors, berries, shrubs, foliage of weeds.

- SECTION H**
  1. Cool arrangements: cool colors as blue, green or white.

- SECTION I**
  1. Wildlife arrangements.

- SECTION J**
  1. Arrangement in pair of containers.

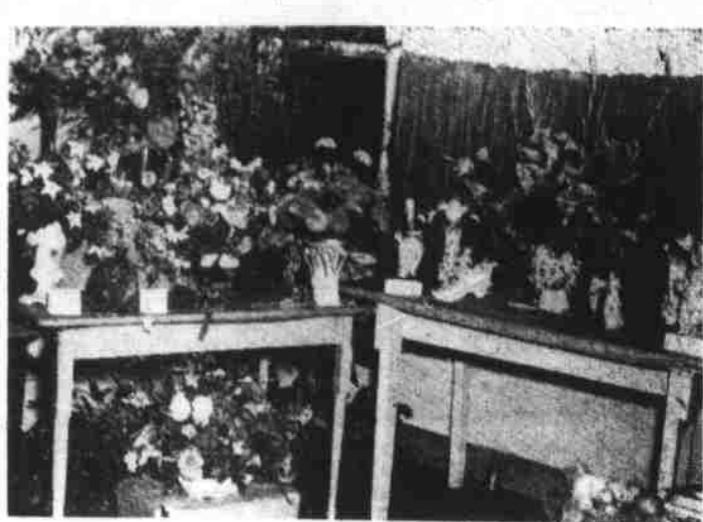

## David McFall, Ex-Newspaperman Dies Here At 88

David McFall, 88, of Maggie, former guide, naturalist, and newspaper man, died in the Haywood County hospital Saturday night following a long illness.

Graveside rites were held this afternoon in West Memorial Park in Weaverville with the Rev. J. Lloyd Mauney officiating.

McFall moved to Maggie several years ago where he could make a study of the woods of the Great Smoky Mountains National Park. He became well-known as a guide in that section until old age forced him to give up hiking.

He was born in St. Louis, Mo. and entered the newspaper field in this country and later in England. He moved to Weaverville about 20 years ago and while exploring forests in that section.
