# Sunday School Lesson

## Peter Became a Man of Power

HE CONVERTED THOUSANDS TO CHRIST

Scripture—Matthew 16:13-17; Luke 22:54-62; John 21:15-17; Acts 2:5.

PETER is, in this writer's mind, a most interesting and human character. He was a devout, well-meaning person, devoted to his Lord, dedicated to His work, but, like most of us, when it came to the test, he was not willing to suffer with his Master.

In fact, when Jesus was arrested and being tried for His life, Peter played the coward, and denied that he knew Him.

That was a great tragedy, and Peter himself was broken-hearted when, after three times denying that he even knew the Master, he heard the cock crow—as Jesus said he would—and the Master gave him one look ere he was led away.

He uttered no word of rebuke or condemnation, for Jesus knew His man. He understood His disciple so well, that He could have faith that from this moment of guilt and degradation, he would rise to new heights.

How many of us, faced with Peter's situation, would have been true to our best? We all

with the other disciples, received the power to perform miracles and to speak with power and authority, words which were to convert thousands to the faith. We need not describe this scene which has been included in many lessons—the "rushing, mighty wind" that filled the house, the cloven tongues of flame which sat on each one.

It was Peter, with John, who performed the first miracle after Jesus left them. The two went to the temple to pray, and at the gate called Beautiful, saw a man who had been lame from birth so that he had become a beggar.

He asked alms, but Peter and John had no money, and Peter said to him, "Silver and gold have I none; but such as I have give I thee; In the name of Christ of Nazareth, rise up and walk."

To the amazement of everyone there, the man actually rose, and not only walked, but leaped and bounded into the temple to thank God for his healing.

"All the people" saw the man, and doubtless told those who had

have fallen down in less severe crises than this one. To have acknowledged that he was a disciple of Jesus would probably have meant death.

Peter could not face this, so he lied—even as you and I—but how nobly he redeemed himself we shall see as this lesson progresses.

It had been but a short time before this that Jesus had asked the disciples what people said about them, and after receiving various answers, had asked them, "Whom say ye that I am?" Peter—the ever-ready talker—had answered fervently, "Thou art the Christ, the Son of the Living God," and had received Jesus' commendation.

The third time Jesus appeared to His disciples after His Resurrection, He turned to Peter and asked him if he loved Him. Peter, of course, said yes, and Jesus said, "Feed My lambs."

Twice more Jesus asked the same question, getting the same reply, and the Master said to him, "Feed My sheep." Peter thus knew he was indeed dedicated to head Christ's work on earth.

On the day of Pentecost, Peter,

not been present, and word of it came to the temple authorities, and they had the two disciples brought before them. Peter was not afraid of martyrdom then. He gloried in his chance to tell of Christ and His Message.

Talking before the high priests and their kindred, he freely admitted the performance of the miracle (which none could deny, as the man was with the disciples), and the church authorities decided it was best to let them go, cautioning them that they should preach no more, and threatening them.

After this many miracles were performed and multitudes were added to the Lord. Peter and John were imprisoned by the church rulers, but an earthquake opened their prison and they went straightway to the temple and preached again.

Brought before the temple rulers again, they were asked why they persisted in doing what was forbidden, and Peter and the other apostles answered, "We must obey God rather than men," and that was that, until Peter at last was martyred—a truly great man.
