Margaret Reese Is Chosen For D.A.R. Contest

Miss Margaret Kathryn Reese has been selected by the faculty and student body of the Waynesville Township High School to represent the school and the Dorcas Bell Love Chapter, Daughters of the American Revolution in the annual Citizenship Pilgrimage contest by the D. A. R. in high schools throughout the United States.

Selection of a Pilgrim is based on leadership, scholarship, character, and contribution to community service.

As local winner, Miss Reese will compile a scrapbook of her school, church, and community activities to enter in the state-wide contest.

Miss Reese, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Roy Reese, is a member of the senior class and an honor student.

She is a charter member and former president of the Tally-Ho Dramatics Club and a member and former treasurer of the Masque and Gavel Society. She is assistant business manager of the 1951 school annual and served last year as junior representative on the annual staff. She is also on the staff of the Local Yoke, the school newspaper, and this fall attended the Editor's Roundtable at Brenau College.

A member of the mixed chorus of the high school for four years, Miss Reese sang with the Festival Chorus at Woman's College in Greensboro in 1949 and also represented the school at Western Carolina Teachers College on Field Day.
