NEW YORK — (AP) — Charley Maloy of Holy Cross and Ted Marchbroda of St. Bonaventure rewrote the forward passing and total offense records, respectively, in the Eastern Intercollegiate Football Association during the 1950 season. Both are sophomores.

Maloy threw 242 passes, crassing the mark of 210 attempts set last year by Ed Soggin of Boston College. Soggin still holds the completion mark of 106. Maloy completed 70 less. Marchbroda set new marks for total offense (1693 yards) and for yards gained passing with 1577. Both records surpassed the marks made by Columbia's Paul Governali in 1942.

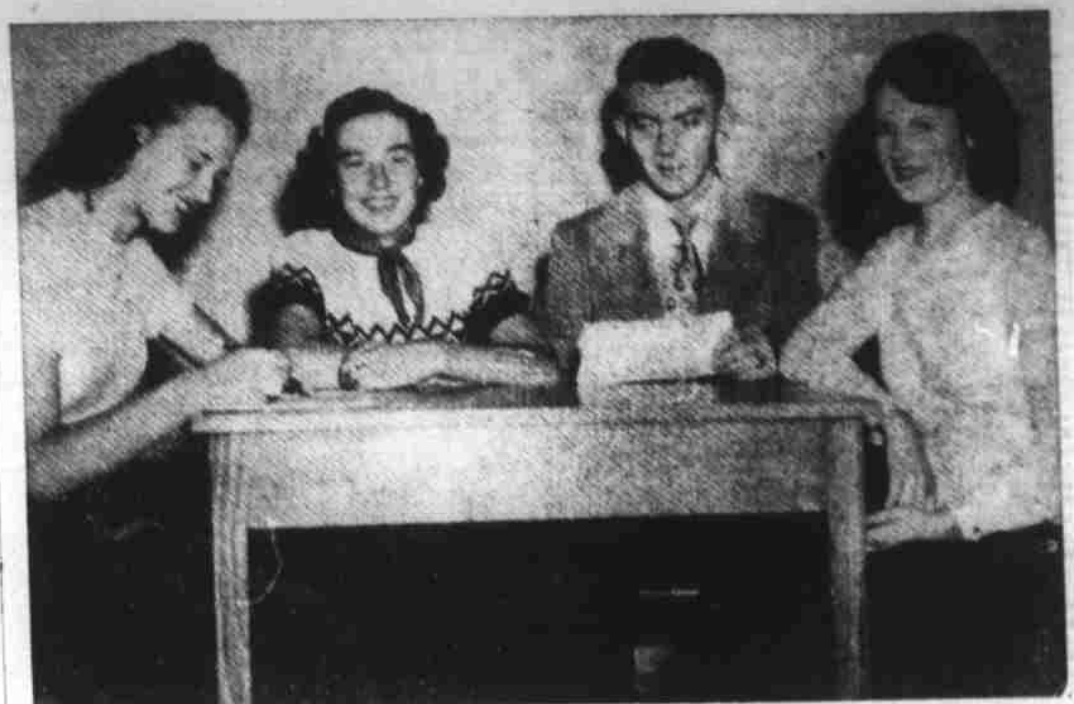
