Floating Fifth Avenue

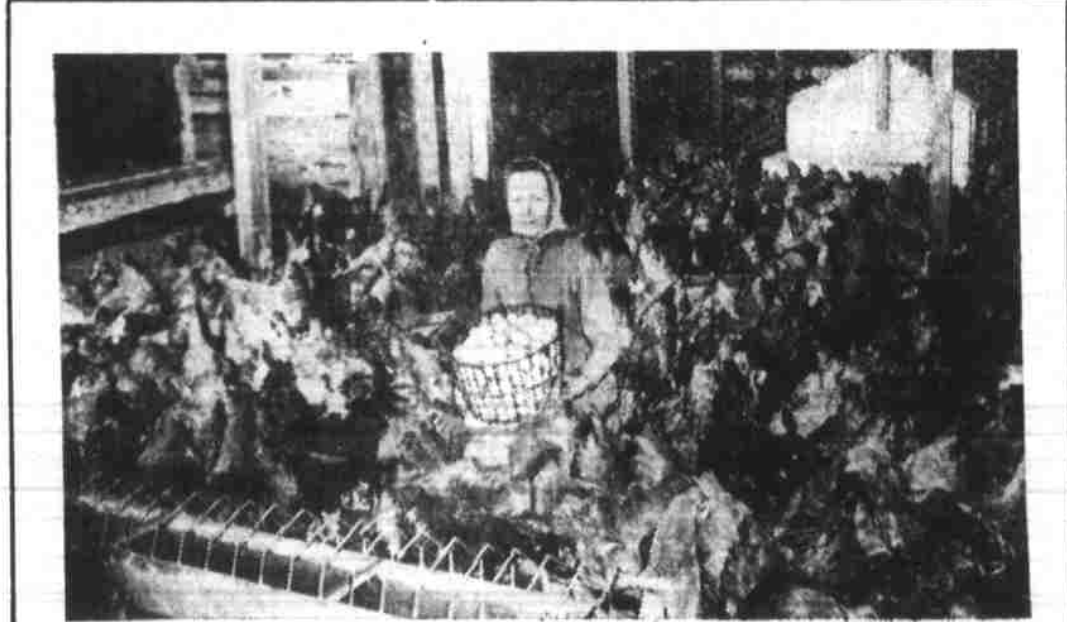
