LOUISVILLE, Ky. — (AP) — Since 1875 when the race was first run, 464 owners have started 799 horses in the Kentucky Derby at Churchill Downs. The largest field to start the Derby was 22 horses in 1928. The smallest fields were in 1892 and 1905. Only three starters went to the post in those years. The largest number ever nominated for the race was 196 in 1926, smallest was 34 in 1876.
