CHICAGO (UP)—The nation's public schools are making strides to help backward children, but neglecting the bright ones, according to a Northwestern University professor.

Dr. Paul Willy, professor of education, said "from 1920 to 1940, scarcely a beginning was made in recognizing and providing for especially bright students through our school system."

Willy said lack of special training wastes smart students' time. He urged teachers to give them special assignments to keep them busy while the others catch up.

Drought Kills Off Deer On Big Texas Ranch

KINGSVILLE, Texas (UP)—An estimated two-thirds of the deer on the sprawling King Ranch in south Texas have been killed or driven off by one of the worst droughts in the area's history.

The report was given to members of the Texas A&I College

natural science society by V. W. Lehman, wildlife conservationist for the ranch.

"It is common to see eight or ten dead deer every day," he told the group. Quail and javelinas (wild hogs) also are suffering.

Lehman explained that the chief cause of death is malnutrition. The conservationist told the students that coyotes have not helped the

foot situation by killing off the unfit deer, because they find plenty of deer already dead.
