WNC Counties Go To Top In Crusade For Freedom Plan

The twenty Western Carolina counties far exceeded any other region in the North Carolina Crusade for Freedom recently conducted, according to Louis M. Connor, Jr., executive director for the state.

Under the chairmanship of James G. K. McClure of Asheville, the counties secured more than 90 thousand signatures and nearly 10 thousand dollars. The total for the entire state was only 205,215 signatures and not quite 17 thousand dollars.

Mr. Connor paid tribute to the splendid work of the hundreds of volunteers who made possible the success of the campaign. He announced that plans for the 1951 drive would soon be released, with emphasis placed on raising funds to construct more radio stations beamed through the Iron Curtain in both Europe and Asia.
