## Drivers License To Be Given Only Monday-Thursday

Starting Thursday, May 3, drivers' license examinations will be given only on Mondays and Thursdays, Examiner R. V. Hooper announced today. The office is open between 8:30 a.m. and 5:30 p.m.

Mr. Hooper also called attention to a change in the state law which permits a driver to have his license renewed as much as sixty days before its expiration, instead of thirty as before.

Under the new law, chauffeurs' licenses, all of which expire in June, may be renewed beginning May 1.

Mr. Hooper again reminded persons whose last names begin with the letters U through Z that they have only two more months in which to renew their licenses. He advised that they and persons holding chauffeurs' permits come to the office as soon as possible to avoid the last-minute rush during June.
