ping up production and their requirements for coal and other fuels will grow steadily greater. Transportation must be provided this year for ten per cent more coal than was produced in 1950 and freight cars suitable for hauling coal are in short supply and will become more so, The situation is, if anything, more acute with respect to tank cars suited to the transportation of fuel oil and liquefied petroleum gases. Cars of these types are experiencing an increasingly heavy demand in high priority defense activities.

"The wise consumer will stockup now, and I join with the Secretary of the Interior in urging governmental and industrial users, house-holders, and retail dealers to lay in maximum supplies during the traditional off season in the fuels trades."
