

More Light, Please

In recent tests it was determined that reading under various intensities of illumination affects tenseness or nervous muscular tension. Further tests with delicate electronic apparatus revealed that the heart-rate increased significantly on subjects who read 10-point type for one hour under one-foot-candle illumination, while it increased far less when the subjects read under 100 foot-candles. Moreover, blinking of the eyes was found to be more frequent when seeing difficulties were uncorrected than when proper eyeglasses were used.
